

PROS AND CONS OF Uber — & — Lyft

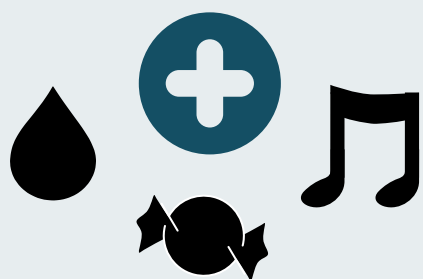
Using ride-sharing apps can be useful when navigating a new city or just moving from Point A to Point B. We created a list of pros and cons for both Uber and Lyft.

Pros



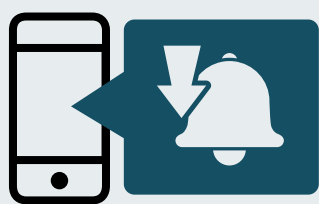
VIRTUALLY EVERYWHERE

Uber is available in 388 cities throughout the world. Even if you're abroad, you know you'll be able to find an Uber.



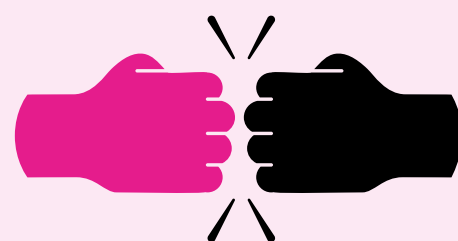
QUALITY SERVICE

Unfortunately, Uber has no cap on its surge pricing. This means that surge can continue to skyrocket during peak hours.



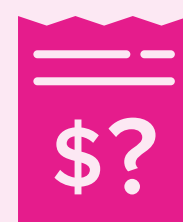
GPS ISSUES
